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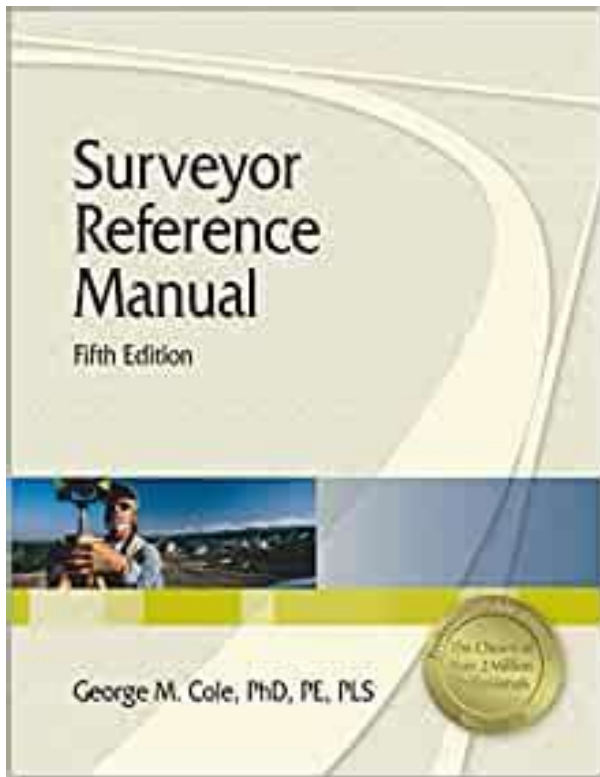
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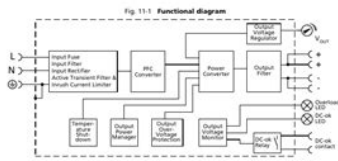
CPIC reference manual



The level established in the agreement is Category II C, except for the National Monitoring Centre whose level of service is Category II C with privileges for the issuance of warrants upon the interruption of the Offender Management System OMS. The National Monitoring Centre will be the central point of contact to assist law enforcement agencies. However, due to the limited databank accesses provided, the CPIC system cannot be utilized to conduct background checks, screening, clearances, etc. In the event that a CPIC user's issued computer is mobile in nature e.g. laptop, tablet, the user will ensure that during the process of accessing the CPIC system, their immediate physical area is limited to authorized personnel only and the information on the screen is protected from individuals that do not have a need to know. Information from CPIC must be verified with the originating agency. If the Agency receives a request for access to information accessed through CPI Centre systems, the Agency will consult with the originating record owner prior to disclosing the information, whether or not the request was made in accordance with access to information, privacy laws, or any other informal or formal means." This individual has been requested by the institution to repair a service or infrastructure within the institution that is deemed critical. It includes Operations, Security and High Security Zones. It is Canada's only national law enforcement networking computer system ensuring officers all across the country can access the same information. It is maintained by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police RCMP with the central registry located at the RCMP Headquarters in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. Local records are maintained of all contact with police for a variety of reasons, and may or may not contain information that would be entered into the CPIC system. 11. Functional Diagram



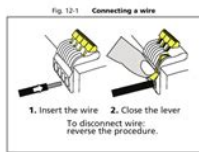

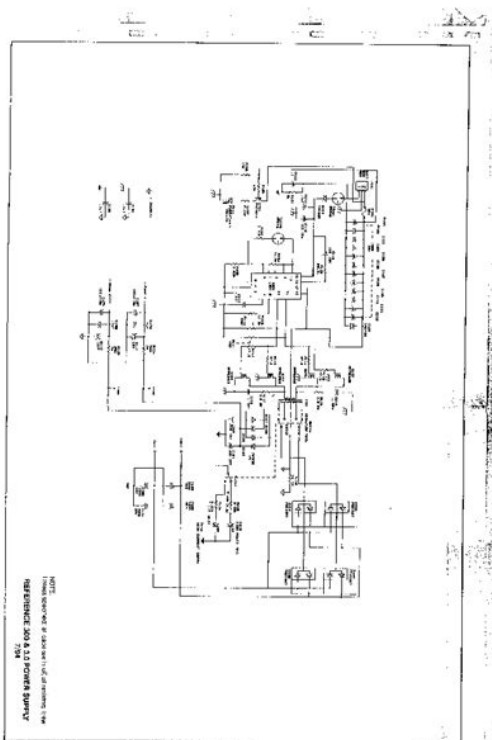
All records added to the CPIC system must satisfy stringent entry criteria in that every record must be, valid, accurate, complete in nature and compliant with input rules. The province of British Columbia has mandated by law that all police forces share a platform, known as PRIMEBC. In Ontario local records are now kept in systems known either as NICHE or Versadex, depending on the Municipalities choice of implementation. In Quebec the system used is called CRPQ Centre de Reseignement des Policiers du Quebec. The RCMP runs a similar system called PROS P olice R eporting O currence S ystem in provinces where they are providing contract policing as well for federal policing. Retrieved 20090121. Nonpolice agencies must enter into a Memorandum of Understanding which sets out the rules for sharing information. They are subject to audit from time to time. Wandering Persons Information is not shared with U.S. agencies. However, you may not be given access to all of your personal information if a legal exception to your right to get access to the information applies. You may also want to make the same or similar access request to your local police department, because a different access law applies to your local police department than to the RCMP, so the information is managed locally. There may be similar limits on your right to see your personal information as those that apply to the RCMP, but because you will be dealing with different agencies, making the request may be worth a try. The scope of this PIA is broad and encompasses the current CPIC system and its future modernized state upon completion of phase 3 of the CPIC Renewal project. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police through the National Police Services is a key service provider to Canadians at the federal, provincial and municipal levels. The law enforcement services are varied and range from protecting Canadians and Canadian interests abroad. In various ways, the RCMP helps to ensure Safe Homes and Safe Communities. This is feasible only with sound management and supporting infrastructure, such as the proper use of information and technology to support the law enforcement community both domestically and internationally. CPIC is a national repository of police information that amounts to a vital shared resource within Canadian law enforcement. Currently, CPIC handles in excess of 120 million queries and stores 9.6 million records in its investigative data banks. The system, online since 1972, has served the law enforcement community well but could not meet the challenges of the 21 st century. CPIC has undergone numerous upgrades over the years to keep up with new technologies and to meet new law enforcement requirements. The passage of time had caused the systems key components to become brittle and unstable with age, and the retirement of key human resources placed the system at critical risk. Its network components were prone to failure and its proprietary software language was difficult to maintain.

A major overhaul, called CPIC Renewal, designed as a fourstage stabilization, modernization and improvement effort, was launched in April 1999 to modernize the system comprehensively and to make future changes easier to effect. Since 1999, CPIC Renewal Project has experienced a major restructuring. CPIC Renewal Project 1, which provided a bypass of the old communications infrastructure for a significant amount of the traffic from CPIC Windows devices and which laid the groundwork for several initiatives that were deferred to Project 2, Phase 1, was completed in the Spring of 2002. Project 2, CPIC Modernization, was subdivided into three Phases Phase 1

Infrastructure Services Modernization completed development and testing summer 2003, providing a new interface specification in June 2003, and rolling out CPIC Windows v2.0 September 15, 2003. As of March 1, 2005, 73% of the total 109 interface agencies have implemented the new interface specification and it is expected that by the end of June 2005 all Agencies will be migrated. In addition, 99% of all workstations have been converted to the new Windows version. Phase 2 PRISM Police Real Time Information System Monitor Risk Reduction PRR completed development and was implemented July 19, 2003, providing a stable, scaleable, modern platform for further development; and, Phase 3 Application Infrastructure and Functionality is currently in its startup phase and was scheduled for an Effective Project Approval presentation to TB on Oct 23, 2003. Phase 3 will introduce some of the most significant improvements that CPIC users have seen since the system was first implemented in 1972 including enhanced security technology and access controls, and improvements to key CPIC functionality areas including Property, Persons, Vehicles and Marine. The CPIC Renewal Project is scheduled to be completed by March of 2005.

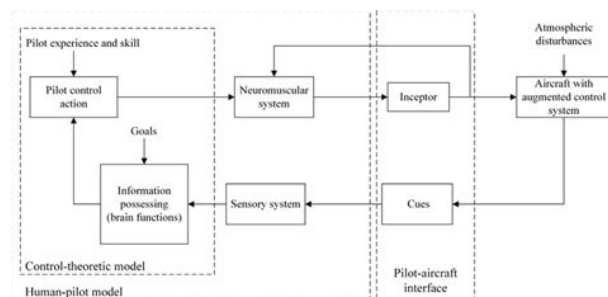

CPIC is already an important component in efforts to improve information sharing between the various components of the criminal justice community. It will continue to be integral to meeting the RCMP strategic objectives by facilitating information sharing at the national and international working levels, thus facilitating the prevention of situations such as terrorist attacks, major violent crimes and crossborder child abductions. It is expected that CPIC will play a prominent role in any Integrated Justice Initiative IJI plan. CPIC is currently cooperating with the Data Standard Secretariat of the Solicitor Generals Integrated Justice Initiative to ensure compatibility with future systems. The events of Sept. 11, 2001 have brought about a sense of urgency for the RCMP to modernize CPIC in order to meet the challenges posed by terrorism and organized crime both domestically and internationally. The current CPIC provides the foundation for immediate operational goals. The release of CPIC Renewal Phase 3 in 2005 will solidify the status of CPIC and serve the longterm strategic goals and objectives of integrated policing and integrated justice. CPIC is an integrated database repository where specific law enforcement data can be entered,

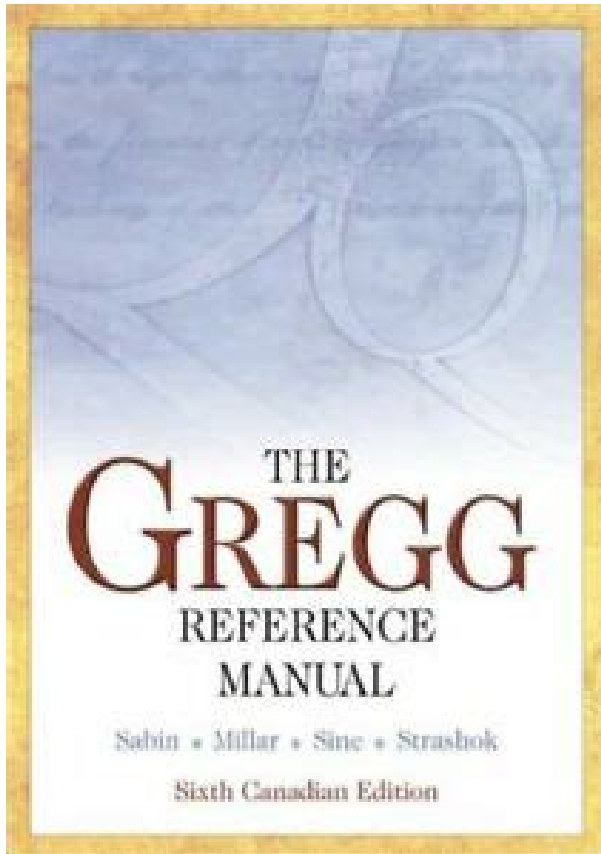
electronically queried and ultimately shared with law enforcement partners in their crime prevention and crime fighting roles. From an operational perspective, the RCMP controls the infrastructure, which comprises CPIC including mainframe computers, and data storage devices located at RCMP Headquarters in Ottawa. However; custody and control of the personal information entered on CPIC is deemed to be the sole domain of the agency making the entry. Access to any information entered by an agency can only be granted by that agency under the authority of the federal or provincial access legislation that applies to that agency. The RCMP currently controls the access to CPIC through a safe file process.

The CPIC Advisory Committee grants access to CPIC. All agencies accessing CPIC are governed by the policies contained in the CPIC Reference Manual. Police agencies do not enter into an MOU to access CPIC. However, nonpolice agencies such as Transport Canada are required to enter into an MOU. As the numbers of partners and the types of information being shared expands, there will be a need for formal MOUs. A memorandum of understanding is a useful vehicle to describe the responsibilities of the parties. Mitigation The RCMP will develop a new memorandum of understanding for new agencies accessing CPIC including the use and disclosure of personal information obtained from the CPIC system. Use of Fictitious Data. Consideration must be given to the use of fictitious data rather than personal information for the noted functions. Mitigation CPIC currently uses an instructional database that contains fictitious data for training purposes. This capability was not suitable for testing. The RCMP will endeavour to provide a testing and training environment where no personal information is used. Data Integrity CPIC is a national repository of law enforcement operational data that amounts to a vital shared resource within Canada law enforcement. The reliability and effectiveness of this support system depends on the accuracy, validity relevance of the data contained within its databanks. Mitigation CPIC has well-established standards and practices to ensure the accuracy, validity and relevance of its data. Each contributing agency is responsible for the data that they input. Reports are provided to ensure that records are validated at periodic intervals. As well, purge reports are generated to ensure that the expiry date of records remains current. The RCMP has not yet established a formal Departmental process to publish documents such as PIAs but policy is currently under development. On top, the database ensures that every law enforcement personnel have access to unique information. Also, the CPIC Canada is linked with the United States National Crime Information Center.

However, not all information is shared such as wandering person registry information is not shared between the two countries. The nonpolicing agencies require entering a memorandum of understanding with the RCMP and might often be audited for compliance. In essence, these people could either be wanted, accused or may be on probation. Persons who have been convicted of crimes and offenses can seek pardon that is controlled by the National Pardon Center. However, providing pardon is granted by the Canadian Government and holds the authority to seal anyone’s criminal

record. All charges and all convictions will be removed and kept separate from active criminal records stored in the CPIC database. Learn how your comment data is processed. The Canadian Police Information Centre, or CPIC, became operational in 1972 after its approval by the Treasury Board of Canada. The RCMP maintain this system and their central registry is located at their headquarters in Ottawa, Ontario. Although the CPIC is interfaced with National Law Enforcement Telecommunications System and the United States National Crime Information Center, not all information is shared. For instance, the Wandering Persons Registry is not shared with the United States. If a government agency would like access to the CPIC, they need to agree to abide by the rules detailed in the CPIC Reference Manual.

They also need to be approved by the CPIC Advisory Committee which is composed of 26 senior police officers from provincial and municipal police forces, the RCMP and the Ontario Police Commission. Any nonpolicing agencies need to enter a memorandum of understanding with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and they can be audited periodically in order to ensure compliance. What is the CPIC It is a computerised information retrieval and storage system. The RCMP operates this system on behalf of the national policing community. It contains or allows access to criminal record data banks and operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. This system is highly efficient and effective. It provides instant information about offenders and crimes to more than 80,000 law enforcement officers. This is the only national information sharing system that can link criminal justice and law enforcement partners throughout the country. The system can also be accessed by United States law enforcement officers via the FBI's National Crime Information Center, or NCIC. Accuracy is essential when it comes to CPIC records. In the beginning, police services were performing these searches based on a signed authorization provided by a candidate, accompanied by government issued identification. The results provided would indicate a clear no record or a not clear there may be a record response. This was inline with the policies and directives of the Government of Canada and was referred to as a Name Based criminal record search. Over time the response provided by the police services changed to where they would provide details of any criminal convictions including; where the offence occurred, type of offence, conviction date and sentence imposed. The results were strictly based on a match of the person's name and date of birth. Over time some background check companies migrated away from the stringent rules imposed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police RCMP which resulted in the RCMP clamping down on the way criminal record checks are performed in 2010. The database is used mainly by police services to store information and records regarding police activities and more importantly, criminal offences. Direct CPIC access is restricted to law enforcement agencies and other government departments and agencies that are authorized by the policies contained in the "CPIC Reference Manual." You cannot be fingerprinted for a summary conviction only offence, therefore these offences would not show on a CPIC search. Also if you are convicted of a summary conviction offence as an adult, you are eligible for a "Record Suspension" formally called a "Pardon" five years from the time you complete your sentence e.g., payment of fine or restitution, completion of probation. Conviction of an indictable offence exposes you to greater penalties.

If you are prosecuted by indictment, you are entitled to trial by jury for most offences. Following conviction of an indictable offence, you must wait ten years before "Record Suppression" eligibility. The Crown chooses or elects the mode of prosecution. Such offences are referred to as "hybrid" or "Crown option" or "dual procedure". Hybrid offences are considered indictable until the Crown makes its election to proceed with Summary conviction. The decision on how to proceed can be affected by a number of things including, criminal history of the accused, how busy the courts are, workload and or availability of evidence etc. The audit caused the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to reenforce its policies and regulations on CPIC information being released to thirdparty companies. Based on this decision the RCMP changed how background check companies perform National Criminal Record searches and what information will be released. This search is authorized under the act when the person being searched will be working in a position of trust over a "vulnerable" person. These types of searches are seen in fields such as Nursing, Child Care and Volunteer fields. The witness must view 2 pieces of Government issued ID and compare the information from the ID to the forms and signature of the applicant. Clear copies of the ID must accompany the consent form. The police will compare the data provided against their database and determine whether the declaration is complete meaning there are no other criminal records other than what was provided and that the declaration is accurate or incomplete meaning the form is incorrect or not a complete listing of the candidate's criminal record. This search is done after the regular name based criminal record search and consists of a search of the following databases Police Information Portal PIP, Firearms Interest Police FIP and the Niche RMS system. Should there be any negative information in these databases outstanding criminal charges, prohibitions, probations etc. the search results will be returned as "Not Clear". This result would suggest that additional investigation of an individual through Fingerprint processing is recommended to ensure that there is no criminal record information of concern. This search can be used to qualify all those who are clear of police involvement or when a higher degree of security is needed for a specific position. Should there be no matches then the results come back "Clear"; however if there is a match the records come back "Not Clear". This is due to the fact that the RCMP cannot positively state that the record found is a match to the individual searched without the comparison of fingerprints. The Privacy Act and its regulations require federal government agencies to confirm the identification of people who request that their personal information be disclosed. All criminal records in the RCMP central repository are supported by fingerprints.

Using fingerprint comparison ensures that when the RCMP releases information on an individual, the information is directly related to the candidate. They can handle the process themselves or a thirdparty company can manage the process. Should Electronic Fingerprints be available in the area the subject resides they will be directed to this location and processed by the company either Mintz Global Screening or another accredited fingerprint agency. If an electronic fingerprint agency is not available, they will be directed to a paperbased agency i.e. a local police service or a Civil Fingerprinting agency to have fingerprints taken on a form C216C. For candidates outside of Canada the RCMP will accept fingerprint forms that contain the following. The results will be returned to Mintz Global Screening after processing by the RCMP who will in turn return the results to the client. The information being searched is considered to be in the "public domain" and therefore exempt from privacy legislation. The details obtained from a provincial search generally include all details of an offence date, location, conviction status and sentence. The search is completed by contacting either electronically, via telephone or in person the court in a particular province and having a "name" search completed. Once a "hit" is determined you would then proceed to have that record pulled and the details obtained. The search generally takes between 315 days depending on the province. The cost can vary from court to court.
